Approval of Instruments to Reduce Drug Poisoning

Updated 10/1/2025

Effective October 1, 2025, OAC 4729-8-02 makes test strips and reagent kits that test for the presence of the following compounds legal to distribute in Ohio:

Compound Name

Fentanyl and fentanyl-related compounds*

Xylazine

Medetomidine**

Benzimidazole-opioids (commonly referred to as nitazenes)

Benzodiazepine and benzodiazepine-related compounds

Per Ohio law (ORC 4729.261), instruments that test for the presence of controlled substances are considered drug paraphernalia. However, recent law changes now permit the Ohio Board of Pharmacy to exempt certain instruments from the definition of drug paraphernalia if the Board determines the instrument demonstrates efficacy in reducing drug poisoning by determining the presence of a specific compound or group of compounds.

The Board has determined that any test strip or reagent kit that tests for the presence of the compounds listed above may be legally distributed and utilized in the state. These compounds are commonly found in street drugs often without users knowing, making it more likely for an overdose to occur. Detecting the presence of these compounds before consuming a drug can save lives.

Fentanyl test strips were legal to distribute prior to 10/1/2025. However, reagent kits to test for fentanyl* and fentanyl-related compounds are now legal to distribute in Ohio.

^{**}Medetomidine is not a controlled substance. However, it was added to the list for approved drug checking instruments in the event of future federal or state action classifying the compound as a controlled substance.

<u>Does this mean that all test strips and reagent kits that test for the compounds listed on page 1 of this document are legal to distribute or possess in Ohio?</u>

Yes. Possession and distribution of any test strip or reagent kit that tests for the compounds listed on page 1 of this document would be legal to possess and distribute under Ohio law. Specifically, the law grants exemption from ORC 2925.14 for any instrument the Board determines demonstrates efficacy in reducing drug poisoning.

By law, the Board is not permitted to approve any instrument that measures the purity of any mixture (i.e., the proportion of a controlled substance within the total mixture).

What is the criteria used by the Board to approve new drug testing instruments?

The Ohio Board of Pharmacy uses the following criteria pursuant to rule <u>4729-8-02</u> when evaluating whether to approve additional instruments:

- Drug poisoning/overdose data, including data from other states;
- Reports from established forensic laboratories in Ohio;
- Reporting from harm reduction organizations in Ohio; and
- Any other information as determined by the Board.

REMINDER: By law, the Board is not permitted to approve any instrument that measures the purity of any mixture (i.e., the proportion of a controlled substance within the total mixture).
